Camp Christian: A Place Set Apart


Camp Christian is committed to providing a place and an opportunity where young people and adults alike can be still and know who God is. We are dedicated to the exaltation of Jesus Christ through excellent programs of worship, education, recreation, and social activity. *(This is the Mission Statement of Camp Christian)*

Let us share some good news about Camp Christian but first a little history. Camp Christian was originally a train depot. It was used by a lot of people from the city coming to the country to enjoy the beautiful area. The train depot was acquired by Christian Churches and Churches of Christ to be used as a church camp. Over the years, many people from First Christian Church have served at camp. A few that come to mind are Pete & Mary Weber, John & Patty Barchey, Jim & Loretta Hauger, Loretta's mom, Bill & Mary Meekins, Wanetta Escherich, and many more people not listed. Thanks to all of you who have given of your time and talents to Camp Christian.

I believe it was approximately 19 years ago the Mill House at Camp Christian fell into disrepair. So much so that it had to be torn down and a new one built. That's where this story starts.

The original loan amount for the Mill House was approximately \$976,000. Just shy of a million dollars. In 2015 the director of camp at the time, Joel White, and the board of directors had a vision, that vision was to pay off the mortgage in 2020. The mortgage at the time was still at \$824,000. So as you can see, that was a very aggressive goal for a five-year timeline. At First Christian, we signed on with the idea and pledged \$25,000 a year for five years from the Snyder Trust Fund, again an aggressive commitment. First Christian Church finished its giving ahead of time completing our \$125,000 pledge in April 2019. The camp mortgage was down to \$194,000. I would like to share with you some good news, As of June 2020 the Mill House is PAID OFF. Isn't it wonderful how you can see God working through his churches to pay off an \$824,000 debt within five years!!!!

Going forward with a debt free Mill House, there are many new ideas and plans coming for the future of Camp Christian. Unfortunately Covid 19 has halted some things at Camp but plans are still moving forward. Many young people, with the guidance of Godly men and women, have made a decision at camp to give their lives to Christ. Camp now has a new director, Greg Voss and any help or support we can provide over the coming years will help young people who might not otherwise have the opportunity to hear God's Word.

When we read Acts 15:36-41, we can get the idea that Paul was task oriented, and Barnabas was people-oriented. Paul and Barnabas got in a sharp disagreement about taking John Mark on their next missionary trip. We know that Barnabas was an encourager. He built people up and saw the potential in people. John Mark was also his cousin! But we should not be too quick to judge Paul as task oriented. As you look into the second missionary journey, you'll find Paul picking up Timothy in Lystra and taking him along (Acts 16:1). Paul was also interested in developing people. Timothy learned from Paul and became the leading pastor in Ephesus. John Mark ended up being a blessing to Paul as well (2 Tim. 4:11) and he wrote the Gospel of Mark. My point is that we need to see the value of people. At first, youth, children, or that new Christian may not seem to have much to offer. But God can do amazing things in people over time. Pour your life into people, not things. Encourage people to grow in their faith. Teach them to follow Jesus and give them a love for the Word. People have value. Leave a spiritual legacy that the next generation can follow.

People can be like the Liberty Bell. Now days it is famous, and you need to go through a metal detector flanked by armed guards who protect this valuable relic. It was once rung when the Declaration of Independence was signed. But it wasn't always viewed as valuable. Back in 1828, the city fathers had decided to give the bell to a bell-maker named John Wilbank in exchange for a replacement. Wilbank agreed to knock \$400 off his bill in exchange for the 2000-pound Liberty Bell. But, when Wilbank went to collect the bell he decided it wasn't worth the trouble. The city sued him because they didn't want it either. The metal was substandard. It was so damaged from structural weakness that it was rung only rarely. Finally, Wilbank relented. He bought the bell and then turned around and donated it back to the city. Some people are like that bell. Like John Mark, they may seem to be sub-standard. They may have faults and cracks in their personality. But God knows that each person has value and potential. Live your life planting spiritual seeds in the hearts of others. You never know what child or new Christian may turn out to be the next Liberty Bell.

Church Covid 19 Update

As a nation we've been through a crazy time dealing with the coronavirus and I want to review what we've been through as a church family. We are not done with the changes yet and as of this writing we are still under restrictions to combat the spread of the virus. Like other churches around the country, we went through Stage 1—No in-person church services. We had to go to Facebook live-stream. Then we did both Facebook and YouTube recorded services. We moved our small groups to Zoom meetings. We thought that all this would be over in two weeks!

Stage 2: The restrictions drag on for months and we get better at doing an on-line service. Zoom is used for many meetings and small groups and socials such as Bingo. We did Prayer Tag. We had two parking lot Sunday worship services.

Stage 3: The Governor puts our county on green and we are allowed back inside with social distancing. We can have up to 50% capacity in our sanctuary. Many people are excited, but others stay home. Adult Sunday school and the praise band are back but we have no children's programs or kid's classes.

Stage 4: The coronavirus is making a comeback and cases go way up in our state as well as many other states. The Governor puts out more restrictions and facemask requirements. We get discouraged. How long will this last? We continue to meet for worship with some apprehension. We are trying to go forward and be safe at the same time.

I don't know what Stage 5 will be, but we must be ready for change. We must keep our spirits up. People still need our help. We want to be a caring, loving family. I hope we can be creative in doing the ministry God has called us to do with social distancing and wearing facemasks. I trust that you will continue to grow in your faith and continue to be fervent in prayer. I thank you for being willing to adapt to the changes. Thank you for your continued financial support. Thank you being so supportive of me and my family as we have tried to get to know our new church family. Tough times don't last, but tough people do!
